

HSC English: Journeys

Two young Sydney men's dream to be the first people in history to cross the Arctic's largely unexplored 'Victoria Island' took them on more than just a gruelling physical journey. Spending 58 days alone – hauling and paddling 250kgs of supplies each in their home-made wheeled kayaks across some of the harshest terrain on Earth - the pair found themselves engaged in a surprisingly mental journey.

Outside their comfort zone and stripped of luxuries, life for Chris Bray and Clark Carter became both wonderfully simple and brutally honest. Enduring the bitter cold, overcoming setbacks and surviving encounters with polar bears and arctic wolves, they came face to face with reality and with themselves, answering a difficult question: "Is travelling more about the destination, or the journey?"

The answer to this and other questions are energetically presented through Chris and Clark's exciting, inspiring and often humorous tale of adventure, exploring the unique physical, mental and inner journeys that come with challenging yourself to achieve what has never been tried before.
